
The Trustees have met to review the Conference and hear about future plans. We have also agreed that we need to reinvigorate how we market and communicate the RASC - to our members and more widely. This

NEWS: 28th Commonwealth Agriculture Conference, Edmonton, Canada

'Connecting the World through Food' was the 28th conference's main theme - and a stellar cast of speakers brilliantly brought this to life, under our enthusiastic MC, Dianne Finstad. Our President, HRH The Princess Royal opened the conference and we were welcomed to Canada by the Lt Gov of Alberta, Hon Lois Mitchell. Keynote speaker Robert Saik - the author of 'The Agriculture Manifesto' - set the scene by describing the forces that he believes will drive the future of agriculture with a growing world population and fewer resources.

Other speakers included Dr Reinhard Grandke of the DLG in Germany, Jeffery Fitzpatrick-Stillwell of McDonald's Canada and Bud Mercer

who spoke vividly about the challenges of planning and conduct of major public events. The closing presentation was given by Greg and Kendal Peterson of Peterson Farm Bros, highlighting how social media can be used to promote and further the understanding of agriculture. mission. The **2019 Understanding & Assistance mission** is set to take us to a corner of the Commonwealth that has not featured as a NG destination before - the Caribbean. An exciting itinerary is being designed to look into the agricultural industry across a number of Caribbean islands to give NG's an insight into this incredibly important tropical part of the Commonwealth.

This year's mission will include a visit to The University of the West Indies which has a world-renowned agriculture department and farm visits to both traditional and ultra-modern commercial units. Participants will also have the chance to visit the associated industries of food, drink and tourism.

The mission is limited to 10 participants, with preference given to new delegates and individuals from developing countries. The total budget including accommodation, food and travel is estimated to be £2,500. Save the date! The 29th conference will be held in Norwich, Norfolk, UK from 30 June to 11 July 2020. The RASC was launched in Norfolk in 1957 and the Royal Norfolk Agricultural Association are delighted to be hosting the 2020 conference. Plans are advancing including pre-conference visits to Sandringham Estate and the Royal Norfolk Show, as well as trips in to the city of Norwich and further afield to Newmarket and into Suffolk. Delegates will have the choice of accommodation at Dunston Hall, a 4* hotel to the south of Norwich, or at the University of East Anglia where the conference is being held. The theme of the conference will be based around the challenges affecting the Commonwealth as a whole, and how these relate to agriculture.
